- If you are wondering about the number of dead geese, many of us have been told previously that it doesn't necessarily need to be reported to the Division of Wildlife. The DOW does, however, recommend leaving the dead ones alone as it is presumed to be bird flu. The ecosystem (eagles, crows, foxes, raccoons, mink, crayfish) should take care of them (sort of).

- Spring is right around the corner. Here are some reminders of what might need to be done to your property.
 - Trees: if they are dead, please have them completely removed! If there are low

- branches, please trim them so people can walk underneath them. You should maintain a clearance of at least 7 feet. March is the perfect time for trimming or cutting down those trees.
- Shrubs: trim them away from the sidewalk at least 6 inches.
- Sidewalks: please remove debris and rocks so people can walk on a clear path.

 Janene Beard worked hard to come up with some better plans to support our landscaping needs. There are several different groups.

- From from Janene: I am excited to announce that we are utilizing 4 new contractors to replace Prestige Landscape.
 - 1: The Turf Care specialist will maintain the grass and rock areas with fertilizer and weed control from April to October.
 - 2: The Landscaper will maintain all trees, shrubs, excess weeds and debris removal, plus perform spring and fall clean up.
 - 3: The Lawn Care will be done weekly, along with irrigation start up and winterization.
 - 4: The irrigation specialist is on-call to fix any sprinkler issues that arise.
- We feel that by utilizing these different specialists, we will have a better outcome and beauty within Otter Pond.
